Too young to read newspaper extras, the little tots overheard older folks saying Col. Lindbergh was missing on his flight South. When final editions appeared on the streets telling of the landing, they knew their prayers had been answered.

Young Girl Gets 14 Years For Bank Robbery

Language, Pa., Dec. 17.—Subjecting an elderly man, a jury of men a verdict which has today sentenced Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers, 26-year-old former University of Texas student on a charge of robbing the Farmers National bank of Bucks, Pa., and fined the penalty of 14 years in prison.

The defendant received the verdict calmly, but in her husband Otto Rogers, young attorney, whose dramatic appeal for either liberty or the electric chair for his wife moved spectators in the courtroom to tears yesterday, it proved a shock.

Agreement was reached by the jury 12 hours after they had for a week had last night argued by District Attorney Fred Standa to secure a verdict "that will set a precedent in the apprehended and their victims and their."

Rogers had pleaded death for his young wife rather than a term in the penitentiary. He termed her "subliminal" as did three alternate who testified for the defense.

Standa had urged that the real defendant is a woman.

The death penalty would have been possible as Mrs. Rogers was charged with having used a revolver when she held up two officials of the Bucks bank last December and obtained \$1,000.

At the time of the robbery, Mrs. Rogers was employed at Reading as a stenographer in the office of Attorney General Fred Standa, now Governor. Her secret marriage to Rogers, while both were university students, was revealed after her arrest.

Mrs. Rogers gave out the slightest sign of emotion, maintaining the same disinterested air that carried her through the two weeks of trial.

Until her motion for a new trial to stand upon the issue of the county jail, her attorneys said. No bond can be given until the motion is acted upon.
