Former Virginian Slain By Bandit

Galax, Va., Dec. 2.—A. M. Edwards has received advices from Akron Ohio, that his brother, Lonnie Edwards, was killed there by a bandit Saturday night, when an attempt was made to rob his store.

Mr. Edwards, who runs a grocery store and meat market in Akron was waiting on a customer, said the message, who asked for a can of milk. As he turned to reach for the milk, the customer pulled his gun, gave the "Hands Up," and demanded all the money in the cash drawer. Mr. Edwards attempted to grab the gun from the bandit and was shot down in cold blood. The other customer in the store was also shot down by the bandit, and is now in a hospital recovering from two bullet wounds in his legs.

Mr. Edwards was shot through the head and died instantly. At the time the message was sent here, the assassin had not been apprehended. The slain man was several years a merchant at Independence and married Miss Laura Boyer of that place, who, with several children, survives. He was related to many prominent people in this and Alleghany County, N. C.

Recent Rains Swell Waters of Lake Stedman

Danbury, Dec. 2.—Aided by recent rains, Lake Stedman, recently completed by local contractors here, and dedicated by members of the Winston-Salem Isaac Walton league, has been rapidly filling and will soon reach the level of the large 37 foot dam retainer. Several feet have been added to the depth of the water since the dedicatory exercises, which were held November 24.

The lake, when completely filled, will be 40 feet deep in some places. It is estimated that the average depth will reach 12 to 15 feet over the entire 50-acre tract.

Contemplated plans now call for the erection of a nice bungalow near the location, which will house the keeper and his family. The lake is adjacent to state highway route 89, and is easily accessible to passing or visiting motorists, and it is believed that in the future large numbers will visit the location.

\$100,000 Alienation Suit By Husband

Charlotte, Dec. 4.—M. A. Stone, designated as superintendent of public schools of Alexander County, is made defendant in a hundred thousand dollar alienation of affection suit filed in Mecklenburg Superior Court by Amos S. Gaither, of this city, a railroad clerical worker.

Gaither charges in his complaint that his bride of nine months went to Taylorsville last September to teach school, and while there she fell under the influence of Stone's "arts and wiles," and was alienated from her husband.

The love of the wife, who was formerly Viola Lyda, was turned to hate, he alleges in the complaint, and she cursed him, threatened to burn his property and to kill him, he charges.
