## New York Governor Speaks in Georgia

### Franklin D. Roosevelt Urges Diversification of Crops in Long Distance Address

Monticello, Ga., May 21.—Every agricultural section of the United States is suffering from "too much concentration" in one or two agricultural products, Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York told the exhibitors and spectators at the pure bred beef type show here today and urged diversification by Georgia farmers, with special reference to the livestock industry.

Governor Roosevelt delivered his address over a telephone hookup from his Warm Springs, Ga., cottage 175 miles away, marking probably the first time such a method of delivering an address has been used in the south.

Seated at his desk in his Warm Springs study, the governor spoke into a telephone and his words were amplified here from the talking tower mounted on the court house.

Commenting on his method of delivering his address, Governor Roosevelt said:

"This is, I think, the first time that a speech has been made from a long

distance away through equipment to a large gathering in the open air. The new development of means will enable me through a television machine to see you and for you to see me seated at my desk in front of the telephone."

### Visits Virginia and Washington

Rev. and Mrs. D. M. Stanley of Mount Airy, Mrs. J. A. Smitherman of East Bend and Miss Blanche Beamer of Mount Airy Route 2 made a trip through Virginia and Washington. On their trip they visited Natural Bridge, Tomb of Lee and Jackson at Lexington, Harpers Ferry, the historic battlefields of Gettysburg and the famous caverns in the Shenandoah Valley.

Returning via Washington they visited the Senate in session, the famous East room in the White House, the national museum and Smithsonian Institute, where they saw the "Spirit of St. Louis" the plane on which Col. Lindbergh won his fame and many points of interest including the National Memorial Bridge. Other places of interest were Lee's home at Arlington, Washington's home at Mt. Vernon and many other places of historic interest including Confederate Veterans Cemetery at Spotsylvania Court House where some of North Carolina's bravest soldiers during the war between the states are buried.
