WAKE COUNTY REPUBLICANS.

The County Convention. The Negroes Snowed Under. None Allowed on the

Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 24.—The Republican county convention renominated the old county ticket and J. P. H. Adams for senate and J. C. L. Harris for the house. A hot fight was waged over a nomina-tion of a negro on the ticket. J. C. L. Harris defeated O'Kelly, the negro candidate.

Prof. Capehart, colored, in a speech declared that the negroes had been sacriaced by the promise of two \$1,800 jobs by other states -we are ashamed for our in the agricultural department and one in the colored blind institution. John Nichols said the negroes were sold out and declared they were entitled to representation. Loue Capehart and other negroes bolted. Jim Young declared against nominating a negro on the ticket. He said he was going to urge the same policy in every county in the State. He declared that too many negroes had been nominated in Craven and other eastern counties and that some of them should be withdrawn.
