SUPERIOR COURT.

G. H. Moore Acquitted of the Charge of Burglary. Report of Grand Jury. Tweedy Murder Case Continued. Talk Of a Special Term to Try Two Murder Cases.

The argument of counsel in the case of State vs. G. H. Moore for burglary, began on yesterday afternoon and continued this morning.

Mr. N. J. Rouse opened the argument on yesterday for defendant and was followed by Mr. Loftin for the State. Mess. Aycock, Wooten & Shaw followed for defendant and Solicitor Duffy closed for the State.

The judge began his charge to the jury at fifteen minutes to 12 o'clock. The case was given to the jury at 12:05 o'clock.

The speeches of all the counsel were good and of a high order.

The matter has been closely contested by both State and defense, and counsel for both State and defense have reflected much credit upon themselves by the able manner in which they have conducted the case.

The jury returned a verdict of not guilty at 12:35 o'clock.

The grand jury having finished its work, came in court this morning, made its report and was discharged. The jail was reported to be in bad condition, filthy and infested with vermin and in need of repairs. The public roads were reported in very bad condition. The judge referred the report to the solicitor to take such action as he thought proper and ordered a copy to be served on the chairman of the board of county commissioners.

Judge Bryan has decided not to take up the Tweedy murder case, as it could not be finished this week. The special venire was discharged. There is some talk of having a special term to try the two murder cases on the docket. As the case has been continued the attorneys for Windal Taylor and M. A. Mills, charged with the murder of Tweedy, have asked the judge to let the prisoners out on bond, and Judge Bryan has the matter under consideration.
