

It is said that LaGrange has it in for Kinston; that some of the LaGrange sports have put up a lot of money and engaged a professional battery for the baseball game here tomorrow afternoon. Kinston's team is weakened by some of the players being away, and it would be no great surprise if LaGrange should win with her hired men. The Kinston boys will, however, put up a brave and deter-mined game, and win, if it is possible for pluck and determination to do so.

The new brick warehouse of the A. & N. C. R. R. in Kinston will be about 40x250 feet, and will be located where. the old wooden warehouse now stands. NEWBERN A WINNER.

Takes First and Second Prizes in Engine Contests.

Wilmington, N. C., July 11.—The 12th annual State Firemen's tournament was opened today with a magnificent parade, which was witnessed by an immense

throng. In the engine contests for best time, from start to finish, the Newbern Button company took the first prize, lowering the State and world's record with 2.371-5 seconds. The Atlantic team, of the same city, took second prize, with a record of 2.413-5.

2.41 3.5. The Goldsboro Eclipse took the first prize in the horse hose-wagon contest. Newbern Button took second and Wilson hose company No. 3 third. Asheville won in State hook and ladder rate with Winston, who took second. Winston won first prize in engine con-tests, throwing water a long distance. Rocky Mount came second, being handl-capped in size of engine and location.
