Claude Outlaw, colored, was before Mayor Webb yesterday afternoon for an affray. The case was bound over to court. Outlaw was put under a \$100 bond, which he gave.

About fifteen conversions have been made up to date at the meetings being held at Worth's school house. The last service will probably be held tonight. Everyone is cordially invited to go out to it.

The devotional meeting of the Epworth League will be changed from Sunday afternoon to Monday night, commencing next Monday. At this season of the year the meeting will commence at 8 o'clock.

We were somewhat mistaken in a recent estimate that cotton was damaged so there would be only half a crop in this section. We are now of the opinion that about three-fourths of an average crop will be made in this section.

The colored graded school will open the same day as the white—Monday, September 24th. The room for the library at the colored school has been plastered and kalsomined. Principal Merritt, colored, says that he expects a large opening of the school. All who intend going should try to be present on the first day.

On next Sunday there will be a Sunday school rally for fathers at the Methodist church. Every father who has children attending school there is especially invited to be present at this meeting at 9:30 a. m. At a later date there will be a rally held for mothers to see the work being done for their sons and daughters.

The ladies of Edwards' Chapel Sunday school will give the second ice cream supper for the benefit of the Sunday school organ fund at Edwards' Chapel on Friday night, August 31st. The "grab bag" that created so much amusement at the last supper will be on hand. Other features will be added. The public is cordially invited.

Thirty-six names have been enrolled at the teachers' institute, which is being conducted at the court house this week by Superintendent Foust. The session was quite interesting this morning. Arithmetic and school government were discussed. Several visitors were in attendance. A special invitation is given to all who are interested in this work to be present at the meetings this week.
