Remember the speaking tomorrow at the court house at 12:30 o'clock by Gen. Carr. Come out to hear him.

The Bryan-Stevenson and Kitchin club will meet tonight at the court house at 7:30 o'clock. It is hoped there will be a full attendance, as there is business of importance to be transacted.

The people of Kinston are talking macadamized streets and paved sidewalks now. We have an enterprising people here, and it is only a question of time when this work will be done.

Gen. Julian S. Carr, of Durham, spent last night in Kinston and left this morning for Greenville, where he was scheduled to speak this afternoon at 1 o'clock. Gen. Carr will return to Kinston tonight and address the people of this and adjoining counties tomorrow, at 12:30 p. m.

Lonnie Moore, about 18 years of age, in the employ of the electric light plant, fell from the top of one of the poles this morning while placing in a carbon. He turned somersaults twice, partially catching the first time and securing a firm hold on the spikes that line both sides of the poles the last time. He was hurt very badly by the spikes lacerating his chest and by one penetrating the left side of his jaw, but his wounds are not dangerous.

Kinston people were surprised this morning to learn that Mr. T. B. Yancey, of Virginia, who married Mrs. Mattie Moore here last Tuesday, had been arrested on the charge of bigamy. Mr. Yancey has a wife and two children near Jason, Greene county, but claims to have been divorced from her. He appeared before Justice J. G. Cox at 11 o'clock and the case was continued till Monday, by which time it is hoped that his wife and children, and the authorities at Boydton, Va., will be communicated with, and the truth known.
