Ice cream and other ices will be served at the store recently vacated by Messrs. T. W. Newborn & Co. next Friday night under the management of the ladies of St. Alban's guild of the Episcopal church. The public requested to attend. Don't forget it.

The Imperial Tobacco company has purchased the lot near the A. & N. C. depot where the old Kinston Oil Mill now stand. The company will very soon commence the erection of a handsome two-story brick building on that lot. The old oil mill main building was purchased from the company yesterday by Prof. W. H. Rhodes, and some of it will be used in the erection of the buildings of the Kinston School company.

A meeting is to be held at Goldsboro on the 20th for the purpose of organizing a baseball league to include Tarboro, Goldsboro, Rocky Mount and Wilson. The promoters hope that Kinston will fall in line and they urge the baseball fans to send a representative to the meeting. Since the very pretty exhibition of ball playing by the Kinston and Goldsboro kids that town has gone daft on baseball and is sure to have a strong team in the league. This league is to be strictly amateur and local, which will make it all the more interesting and exciting.

The injunction against the county commissioners restraining them from running the county fence on the lands of W. H. Jackson and others has been dissolved. The order was signed by Judge Allen, but he later modified it, allowing the fence to be erected on the land of Mr. W. H. Jackson. This was done to benefit a number of farmers desiring to make crops this year, but wanted them protected against the ravages of roving stock. This merely affected one strip of land belonging to Mr. Jackson. The commissioners' attorneys Messrs. Lottin and Shaw, later carried the matter before Judge Timberlake, who dissolved the injunction granted by Judge Allen and issued an order restraining Messrs. Jackson and others from interfering with the county

commissioners in erecting the fence. The commissioners of course will give the bond, \$200, which is always required in such cases, to insure Messrs. Jackson and others against damage. The matter will be heard in court and disposed of some time this summer.

A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce is called to meet in the court house Friday night at 8 o'clock, when a permanent organization will be effected. Over one hundred members have been secured. The committee will not be able to reach everybody, but everyone interested is urged to be at the meeting Friday night. Don't feel slighted because the committee failed to see you. You are wanted to help swell the list and use your influence toward pushing the town's best interests to the front.
