KINSTON, N. C., June 27, 1902; Proposed British Customs Union

There appears to be a growing septiment in inducatial quarters in England in favor of a British imperial dustoins union. Archibald Colquboun, who ha China and the Chinese question, read an elaborate paper a few days ago in London, in which he advocated a modification of the existing system, and it was supported by the majority of a representative and intelligent audience. Part of the British cabinet, notably Mg. Chamberlain and possibly Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, favor the same policy, while of the five colonial premiers sooh to meet in London three. Sir Wilfrid Laurier of Canada, the Hon. Mr. Seddon of New Zealand and Sir Gordon Sprigg of Cape Colony, are strongly in favor of a customs union by which the colonies can secure a preference in the British market. It is noteworthy also that an increasing number of writers in the British magazines and reviews have declared themselves on the same side. Some of these statesmen, includrier and Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, were a few years ago convinced and outspoken free traders, and the fact that their views have been, so far as they concern the tariff question in relation to the unity of the empire, substantially modified recently is full of sugges tive possibilities for the future. >

Much depends upon the attitude of the British artisan. It is asserted that he has become partly an imperialist, at least so far as the protection of British manufactures is concerned, and that his vote is no longer solid for free trade. Nothing but a general election could decide this, but in the meantime it cannot be doubted that the leaven of an Imperial customs union is working in Great Britain, especially in the colo-

The Expertation of Beef'

In view of the prevailing high prices of beef the latest bulletin of exports issued by the treasury department at Washington contains some figures of exceptional public interest. It appears that during the mouth of May, despite the alleged shortage of cattle in this country, there were exported 23.124 hend, valued at \$2,000,366. This was a decline of about a third as compared with May of best year, but in the cir cumstances a much bigger decline might have been expected. The exports of cumed beef, on the other hand. showed a large increase, the amount being 6,679,943 pounds, valued at \$707. 754, against 3,517,250 pounds, valued at \$335,400, in May of last year. Exports of dressed beef, which, with canned beef, forms the particular prodnet of the beef trust, were also heavy. Pavements of glass, having satisfactorily withstood the test of actual use in Zurich, Geneva, Lyons and other Swiss and French cities, are now to be tried in Paris on the Rue Trenchet, in the rear of the Madeleine. The material used for paving-is not ordinary glass. It is prepared specially, and yet it is cheap, as it is made of oid bot-ties and the like remeited. The glass is ground to powder, strongly heated until it assumes a pasty consistence and pressed into molds. The blocks of this "devitrified" glass have all the hardness and durability of ordinary glass without its fragility.
