The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session last night, and after transacting some routine business proceeded to the election of an alderman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Tull, who resigned to qualify as chairman of the board of county commissioners. Several names were placed before the board and Mr. J. W. Collins was selected. Application was made by Major Nell, in behalf of the International Telephone Company, for a franchise to install a system of telephone service in town. No action was taken in this matter further than to postpone it to the regular monthly meeting of the board in January.

Mr. J. W. Grainger, president of the Chamber of Commerce, has appointed the following as the committee to investigate the means and advisability of securing for Kinston street improvements: W. B. Webb, J. F. Taylor, L. Harvey, J. A. McDaniel and T. W. Mawborn. This committee is to have a good deal of latitude in their investigations and if necessary formulate a bill to present to the legislature, to have the city's charter amended so that an election can be held to issue bonds to secure these improvements. They will also listen to propositions from private sources as to having private stock companies to put in these improvements.
