Daily Newspaper on Shipboard.

The Marconi Wireless Telegraph company has entered into a contract with a British mail steamer sailing from Liverpool to New York, whereby the company agrees to furnish the vessel, while on the trip, a daily service of news telegrams. The vessel will be equipped with the Marconi apparatus, and also with a complete staff plant for the publication of a daily newspaper.

The experiment will be tried at the end of the current month. The name of the vessel is withheld at present.
