The county board of education is in session today.

Mr. Asa White, of Ft. Barnwell, died last night of dropsy and will be buried today.

The new postoffice building is nearly finished and as soon as the furniture comes and is placed in it will be ready for the postmaster.

The Stevenson house is being moved from its old home at the corner of Queen and Gordon streets to the corner of Independent and Gordon streets.

The city clerk reported to the board of education of Lenoir county today that \$514.80 had been collected for fines imposed by the mayor during the year 1902.

The east bound train was over an hour late this morning, causing the two trains to meet at Kinston. The cause of its being late was waiting on connection at Goldsboro.

The parlor car "Vance" was attached to the mail train this morning and a party from Morehead City and Newbern was on board going to Raleigh. Mr. J. W. Grainger joined the party at Kinston.

Notwithstanding the very inclement weather yesterday church services were held in all the churches but one, which was previously announced, with fairly good congregations considering the weather.

George Dall, white, and Levi Bright, colored, were before the mayor today for assaulting each other and judgment was suspended upon the payment of the cost. Charles Mumford, colored, was also up for being in a state of intoxication at the depot Saturday night, and fined two dollars and costs.

A very considerate chicken thief visited Mr. T. R. Lee's chicken coop Saturday night, taking only two nice fat "birds" from a coop of six. Mr. Lee had a half dozen chickens in a small coop to fatten for his table and the thief went to the coop Saturday night and relieved him of two of them and all the eggs he could find.

Mr. Charlie Laester, who lived about nine miles north of Kinston, in Greene county, died Saturday evening of pneumonia, after an illness of about two weeks. Mr. Laester was 51 years old and was a prominent farmer of the county and very popular with all who knew him. He was not a man of family, never having married, and leaves a large estate. His remains were interred yesterday.

A mule that was hitched to a post in front of Einstein Bros' store Saturday evening became frightened at something and tried to break loose but got the wheels to the cart entangled with the post which prevented his getting away. This seemed to make the mule panic-stricken and he then tried to go through the store, and would have done it but for the fact that the post still held him. His actions created more or less excitement and amusement.

Policeman Brinson has warrants for the arrest of eleven colored men and boys for robbing and otherwise threatening and frightening the inmates of a house across the river on Mr. Jake Parrott's place, some time ago. Mr. Pate, who lives in the house, was at home at the time and shot at the miscreants, but hurt none of them. The crowd of hoodlums went to the house some time ago and threw rocks, sticks and even pieces of fence rail at the house, frightening the inmates, who were all women and children but Mr. Pate, nearly out of their senses, and the crowd has since been very scarce until the last few days. Policeman Brinson succeeded in spotting them and had warrants issued for them and will have them tried next Saturday by which time he will have a general rounding up.

A Cold Wave Coming? The following comes from the weather bureau at Raleigh.

Raleigh, Jan. 11.—A cold wave is approaching. The temperature will fall to a minimum of about twenty five degrees in the west tonight and to freezing or below on the coast Monday afternoon or night.

## Court in Session.

The special term of superior court authorized by the governor for the trial of civil causes, convened this morning at 10 o'clock with Judge E. B. Jones, of Winston, presiding.

This is Judge Jones' first court to preside over, he being one of the newly elected judges, and he has made a very favorable impression on the bar at this place.

The members of the bar speak in high terms of the manner in which he works to expedite the business of the court and his willingness co-operate with them in such manner as is proper to facilitate the work. His appearance is prepossessing, being a large man physically and impresses one as having unusual ability.
