The diphtheria situation is practically without any change today. One new case developed yesterday, which was promptly quarantined and is un-der control of the attending physician. The health board will place flags at all infected houses to designate them. He also carried off a box containing 10 or 12 dozen eggs and some other merchandise, the exact amount of which is not determined yet by Nunn. The boldness of the act can be imagined when it is known that the window broken into is under the glare of the electric light, in a neighborhood that is pretty thickly settled with people. No clue to the perpetrator of the robbery has been found as yet but it is thought that he must have had accomplices.
