**KINSTON ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE**

To Be Permanently Organized. Ladies Auxiliary.

The executive committee of Kinston Anti-Saloon League met last night and formulated a constitution for the permanent organization of a local league to cooperate with the State league. A full meeting of the league will be called to meet in the Court House on Friday, July 3rd at 8:30 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of ratifying the constitution, electing officers, appointing delegates to the meeting of the State league and great Temperance Conference to be held in Raleigh July 7th, and for the transaction of such other business as may rightfully come before the league. The executive committee also recommended that Ladies Auxiliary be organized.
