At the State convention of tobaccoists at Raleigh, yesterday, for the purpose of raising funds and material for a tobacco exhibit at the world's fair, in St. Louis, next year, a State central committee was appointed to raise these funds and material, consisting of eight prominent tobaccoists of North Carolina. Mr. Hoge Irvine, of our city, was appointed a member of the committee.

Mr. Mark Mewborn has installed a mammoth refrigerator in his large grocery store, at the corner of Gordon and Queen streets, that is commodious and very convenient. It has a number of compartments and can almost accommodate a small grocery. Mr. Mewborn will not only keep butter, lard, meats and such things in his large refrigerator, but will also keep fancy bottled goods, fruits and even watermelons, the space being sufficient to put a great deal of such things on cold storage. For heavy things, such as lubs of butter and lard, there is platform on wheels to handle them without trouble. It is a very convenient affair.

The water in the famous court house pump is not so good as it used to be, due, it is said, to the improper drainage. As the water is pumped out now it trickles back into the well, thus taking impurities into the water that detracts from the proverbial sweetness of the water from this pump. Many have been the parched tongues cooled by sweet draughts from its never-failing stream, and it is said that the influence of its waters are so far-reaching in their effect as to "bring the wanderer from far and near" to again indulge in its cooling draughts. However, this may be, the water is not what it was, but with a little expense this can be remedied. It has been suggested that a metal covering would prevent the cause of the trouble.

Washington, Greenville and Kinston to be Connected.

Washington, N. C., July 9.—It is stated from Philadelphia that there is to be an electric line between this city, Greenville and Kinston, looping back here. It is said the name of the underwriting bond syndicate that proposes to finance the electric line is Uphur & Co., of Philadelphia. This bond syndicate is well rated financially and the investment that it is said they will make is one out of a dozen or more splendid business chances in this section. The linking of the small towns and the cities in Eastern Carolina by an electric line would mean the making of the section.
