The Kinston Rifles leave on the train this afternoon for the encampment at Morehead City. A special train will bear the soldiers of a half dozen towns down this way this afternoon. The second regiment is composed of 12 companies, some of which will go down over the Coast Line via Wilmington and Newbern. They will be in camp a week.

There will be a meeting of the Christian Endeavor society at the Christian church tonight at 8 o'clock. The Contract Will be Let Tonight.

The committee appointed by the board of aldermen to investigate the waterworks and sewerage system of towns like Kinston, have returned and will make their reports tonight to the board of aldermen, when one of the proposals submitted by the engineers to make specifications and plans will be accepted.

The committee inquired into the work done by these engineers at other places while away and will report to the board tonight the result of their inquiry.

After the acceptance by the board of the proposal to survey the work and make specifications and plans six weeks will be required by the engineer to do this work before the ground will be broken for installing the system, but it is assured the public that within 12 months Kinston will have an adequate water and sewerage service—before the hot season comes again.

It is estimated that \$75,000 will be enough for this purpose and after allowing of the \$150,000 bond issue sufficient for additions to other necessary public utilities there will be enough to pave a good part of Queen street, at least.

The committee appointed by the board of aldermen was Mayor Rouse and Alderman J. W. Lynch and W. D. LaRoque, Jr.

The Fight to Begin.

At a meeting of the temperance forces last night it was decided to at once circulate petitions for the holding of an election under the provisions of the Watts act for the establishment of a dispensary in Kinston. It is proposed to hold the election on or about October 1st.

From now until then the municipal temperature may be expected to rise. The temperance people are in the fight to win, and will leave no stone unturned to secure that end.
