Gov. Charles B. Aycock was a passenger on the eastbound train this morning for Morehead City. The governor made an address yesterday at Wilmington at the Labor Day celebration, and was listened to by a large crowd.

A movement is on foot to have the inimitable Sam Jones here for a lecture this fall. The Epworth League is negotiating with the Southern Lyceum Bureau for a date with either Rev. Mr. Jones or the celebrated Polk Miller, the negro dialect imitator and lecturer.

Trains Nos. 5 and 6 on the A. & N. C., the "shoo-fly," going through to Morehead was discontinued yesterday and will only run to Newbern and return to Goldsboro, except Sundays, when the Sunday excursion to the seashore will run as usual until further orders.

Messrs. David Holloman and W. H. Humphrey, from Southwest township, were bound over to court this morning by justice Cox for assaulting each other. This case was referred to a few days ago in THE FREE PRESS when Mr. Holloman was cut by Mr. Humphrey on Mr. W. O. Wooten's place, while he was stacking fodder.

Wonderful Fayssoux.

Prof. Fayssoux went through his program of wonderful feats of hypnotism, mind reading and clairvoyancy last night in the opera house though there was a very small and consequently discouraging house. To say that his feats are wonderful does not fully express it, they were simply incomprehensible to the average mind when not seen, and but for the evidence of one's own eyes are not believable.

The carriage drive yesterday afternoon in which he located a key hidden in an obscure place and then went to the postoffice and found the right box, selected a letter addressed to Mr. G. H. His name is Henry Holloman, a negro, who is accused of burglary. The other prisoner is a negro also and is accused of shooting into a crowd of white men who were out o'possum hunting. His name is Dave Livingston. Both cases will be tried this week.
