Mr. J. W. Hood's 9-year-old daughter, who lives in the edge of Jones county, fell and broke her arm several days ago. The arm was set by Dr. Ray Pollock, of Dover.

Misses Stella Meacham and Kathleen Kilpatrick have returned from the northern markets where they have been for some time buying millinery and fancy goods for Miss Meacham & Co.'s establishment.

Ross Best, the colored baseball player, arrived in the city yesterday and says the report that he was shot is absolutely without foundation; that he has played ball with the Goldsboro team at Richmond, Norfolk and other cities and has been in no trouble.

Miss Eulalia Calhoun, who has been in the employ of the Gay Lumber Company as stenographer for some time, left last evening for Richmond, Va., where she has accepted a position. While here Miss Calhoun made many friends who regret to part with her.

At the special meeting of the board of aldermen Saturday night an ordinance was passed against jumping on and off the merry-go-round while it is in motion. This is a wise precaution against certain injury to the young folks if the practice had been kept up.

A little 9-year-old colored boy was run over by a horse and buggy driven by Mr. Dave Fordham, Saturday afternoon, in front of Mr. Mark Mewborn's store and his leg was bruised by the horse stepping on it. The boy was looking in an opposite direction and did not see the approaching team.

Mr. J. W. Hood, of Jones county, reports a very fine yield of corn on his farm. He says that he has about 10 acres of land planted in an improved corn from which he expects to make some 15 or 20 barrels per acre. Several of the stalks bear six ears a piece and some bear nine ears a piece. The general run is from two to nine ears.

Mr. Roland Hardy, secretary of the Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Company, a local insurance society, paid to Mr. Jesse Fields \$275 Saturday, the full face of his policy, covering the loss by fire some time ago of his residence and furniture in Vance township. It is understood that Mr. Fields had only paid \$1 in premiums on the policy.

Trustees' Meeting.

The board of trustees of the Kinston graded schools, met Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at Canady's hall for the purpose of accepting deed for lots for school building for the colored school. Mr. L. R. Varner, attorney for the board, found the title good and properly probated, and the board accepted the lots, allowing \$650 for the two lots situated on Davis street.

The old building will be for sale and the board is ready to receive bids for same.

Dispensary Election Oct. 27th.

A petition asking for an election for a dispensary was presented to the board of aldermen Saturday night signed by 263 voters and the number being in excess of the required number an election was ordered to be held in this city on Tuesday, October 27th.

The committee to whom was referred the petition that was presented to the board Friday night reported four less than the required number, but a supplementary petition made more than the number and the election was accordingly ordered.

Mr. O. T. Boney was appointed registrar for the election.

The election will be held according to the custom for holding such elections and a majority of the votes cast will be required to decide the result.
