Mr. and Mrs. Phillips moved to this place about two years ago since which time they have made many friends who will learn with regret of Mrs. Phillips' sudden death.

Five young children survive the mother to mourn their loss, the youngest, Master S. R., Jr., being only six years old.

Mr. Phillips, who was at his wife's side when death came, returned here yesterday and carried his children to Auburn last night to attend the funeral at that place today.
