Mr. John Brown Dead.

Mr. John Brown, one of the oldest altizens of the city died yesterday afternoon as a result of a second stroke of appoplexy which occurred while he was at the breakfast table yesterday morning. He suffered a stroke about two years ago since which time his health has been poor and death was not a surprise.

Mr. Brown was born in 1840 and had be fived till June 1994 would have been 64 years old. He leaves a widow and four children, Mrs. M. V. Dixon and Mr. Lovick Brown, of this city, and Mrs. G. W. Scheolky and Mr. Victor Brown, of Newport News, Vs. In the passing of Mr. Brown Kinston loses one of its most familiar figures and unique characters, a man well known and universally liked. In the early history of Kinston Mr. Brown was an active and prominent figure in the business of the place. He was a good soldier in the civil war, going through the entire struggle of four years, except when he was captured and imprisoned by the enemy. He was at Hatteras, the first battle in the State, and at Bentonsville, the last. Thus, one by one, the old landmarks are being removed.




