Free dirt will be given for the hauling at the vacant lot in the rear of the Lenoir Drug Company's store, where excavating for a building is undergoing.

The Gornto Shoe Company, in Greenville, has assigned, W. L. Hall being the assignee. Assets are about \$12,000, and liabilities nearly \$15,000. Geo. Gornto, formerly of Kinston, and H. L. Hodges, of Washington, were the company.

Disregarding the city ordinance prohibiting that nuisance, owners of chickens in some parts of the outskirts of town are allowing them to run on the streets. Offended gardeners have complained to the police and the law will be enforced.

At the Dixie theatre tonight, in three reels, will be offered "The Case of Cherry Purcell", a detective story by the Eclair company. Barbara Tennant is starred. The plot is filled with bits of exciting adventures and a pretty strain of romance. Vaudeville will be resumed this evening.

When the Central News of America, organized to compete with the Associated Press and other newspaper associations, begins operations in New York on March 30, Kinston will be the clearing point for 10 east Carolina counties, and all news handled from the district will bear the Kinston dateline.

Samples of advertising matter which may be placed by the chamber of commerce with leading newspapers in several states, have been submitted by the Clinton, S. C., concern with which the contract is expected to be placed. As the topline of one proposed ad. is the nobby and original phrase, "Kinston, the biggest town of its size in the state," The chamber may authorize the advertising on next Tuesday night, when its regular monthly meeting will be held.

Work was commenced today on a water main to be laid on East Chestnut street. The main, of 4-inch pipe, will be about a quarter mile in length and will connect with three new hydrants. An old 10-inch well at the main pumping station has been deepened from 300 feet to 370 and re-lined with an 8-inch pipe, securing a natural flow of 75 gallons a minute whereas before only 50 was secured with the aid of an air compressor. Another well of the type is being similarly treated.

Only one case was disposed of in civil court Wednesday, that of Barfield vs. Creech. The verdict was for the defendant. At a previous trial the plaintiff won in this case, involving the possession of about 10 acres of farm land and a boundary dispute, whereupon the defendant appealed and gained a new trial. The matter of Cox vs. Kinston Manufacturing Company was gone into and was not concluded when court opened today. The colored plaintiff alleges personal injuries received on the company's logging road due to the method in which bears were hunted.

A large congregation heard with interest Rev. E. C. Glenn deliver a powerful exposition of the scriptural doctrine of repentance Wednesday evening in Caswell Street Methodist church, where a revival meeting is in progress. His discourse was lucid, convincing, scriptural, earnest and thoughtful, and made a profound impression on the audience. These meetings are proving a great blessing to many careless Christians and unconverted persons, as well as to the active Christian workers of the churches, says Pastor J. M. Wright.
