CHAUTAQUA WEEK.

Don't forget the June Chautauqua. It's not a bit too early to begin to plan for it. We ought to take steps to give it the widest publicity. The Chautauqua Association of Pennsylvania is going to put forth special efforts to advertise the event; but we must not rest with that. In order to get the best result, from the occasion we should give it the widest publicity possible.

We would suggest that business men and others advertise it on every letter sent out between now and June 24th and that we use all other methods of publicity that may be available. We are going to have a big time in Kinston during chautauqua week and we want everybody to know it. That occasion could well be made a home-coming week, too.

Let's make the chautauqua a big success as well as a pleasant time!

NEGLECTED CHILDREN.

"I believe that three-fourths of crime comes from neglected children," said Judge Oliver H. Allen in his charge to the Wake county grand jury the other day, as told in the News and Observer. And one of the first cases that was called after his honor had finished his charge was State vs. William and Hubert Pierce, charged with assaulting their father. The defendants are both boys, the older being 20 and the younger 17. The report goes on:

"Judge Allen asked the elder if he could read and he said he couldn't. The younger had slight ability to stumble over the printed page. Who is president of the United States? Judge Allen asked the seventeen-year-old boy, and he didn't know. The senior said Wilson. And who is governor of North Carolina? Judge Allen asked the elder, who was forced to pass. The jurist asked the younger then, and he said 'Taft.' But the folks didn't laugh much. It was too tragic."

And indeed it was typical of one of the tragedies of our day: Neglected childhood and youth. These youths who had assaulted their old father were the product of neglect not alone in the home but of neglect by society organized as a state or as churches or other bodies whose only excuse for being is the elevation of the human creature. The questions propounded and answers given made it clear that the state had neglected them in the matter of education. It is the state's business to provide its children—its most valuable asset—not only with the means of obtaining an education, but it should, by compulsory attendance measures, see that they take the tonics thus provided. And by compulsory attend-

ance measures we mean measures that really amount to something. The present compulsory attendance law in this state is just about as weak as water. It will never reach and remedy the curse of popular ignorance.

We conduct our affairs in both state and church too much as though these organizations were instituted solely for the sake of the adult man and women; whereas in a very pronounced phase of the subject the adult is the least important element entering the problem of government and social uplift. As the twig is bent so is the tree inclined. And if the church and government and other forms of organized society do their duty by the child in his earlier years it will be found that comparatively little special effort will have to be expended for the sake of the wayward adult. Proper care given to childhood and childhood's interests will by no means solve our social ills, but it will greatly lessen the load as well as very materially accelerate our progress as a race.

THE NEXT POSTMASTER

Name of W. D. LaRoque Sent to Senate by the President.

The president Tuesday nominated Mr. Walter Dunn LaRoque, business man and former mayor, to be postmaster of Kinston. His name will go before the senate committee in a day or two probably and the nomination will be confirmed by the senate next week. Mr. LaRoque is the selection of Congressman Claude Kitchin and was unopposed by senatorial influence. He will probably take office about June 1, the tenure of the incumbent expiring May 31.

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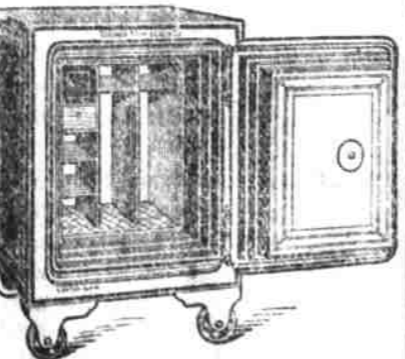
