NO FILTH: NO FLIES.

Investigators tell us that houseflies are usually born within 300 to 500 feet of the place where you see them. They do not fly far, so the breeding place is not hard to find. The slogan "Swat the fly" has resulted in a large amount of good all over the country, but a better slogan is "starve the fly." A little prevention in the way of removing filth would accomplish this result, and there would be no chance for more flies from the same source. No filth, no flies.

Perhaps typhoid germs are the most deadly germs fly carries. You may strain dirt out of milk, but when a fly gets one foot on the edge of the milk can it may be starting the growth of thousands of typhoid germs.

If there are flies in your house, kill them. Then go outdoors and cover every garbage pile, remove every manure pile at least once a week, and screen every outhouse within 500 feet, or better still, build it fly-tight and place water-tight cans under it. Get your neighbors to do the same.

FLIES, FILTH AND TYPHOID.

"What's causing all our typhoid fever?" was the question put to Dr. Ridlon, the typhoid expert who is at present examining conditions at Raleigh.

"It will probably take ten days or two weeks to finish up the examination here," said Dr. Ridlon, "and my findings will all be given in report form at that time. At the time the exact source or sources of typhoid can not be definitely determined.

"In general, what causes the high typhoid death rate in this state in the summer?" was the next question.

"Well that is a comparatively easy question," said Dr. Ridlon. "When you consider all the old, open, insanitary privies the general prevalence of flies, and the frequent absence of screens and screen doors, the only wonder is that you don't have more typhoid than you do." Continuing, Dr. Ridlon gave it as his opinion that until the public and our public officials appreciate more fully the importance of cleanliness with respect to the highest of filth, human excreta, and the part flies play in carrying such material to our kitchens and dining rooms, we shall have to pay the awful death penalty inflicted every summer. In towns and villages it is a barbarous custom to have these old, open outhouses where flies can easily infect a neighborhood. Sewers or sanitary outhouses he thinks will largely solve the problem. A part of the typhoid is due to and

drinking water. Private well supplies are particularly dangerous. In cities and towns the public supply is almost invariably safer than 95 out of 100 ordinary wells.

FOR NEW TRIAL OF FRANK

Counsel for Condemned Man Will File Motion in Court Today.

Atlanta, Ga., April 15.—Counsel for Leo M. Frank, the young factory superintendent under sentence of death for the murder here of his employe, Mary Phagan, 14 years old, tonight completed plans for the filing of an extraordinary motion for a new trial for Frank tomorrow.

Filing of the motion will automatically stay the execution of Frank until Judge Hill, of the superior court, makes a decision on the new trial application. The convicted man is now sentenced to hang Friday.

The motion for a new trial will be based on the claim of newly discovered evidence and the repudiation of testimony given by witnesses at the previous trial of Frank. Methods used by the prosecution in preparing the case against Frank also are attacked in the application.

Affidavits attacking the testimony given against the character of Frank and contradicting statements made by James Conley, the negro factory sweeper, are included in the new trial motion, a copy of which was made public recently. Conley was the chief witness against Frank. He was convicted as an accessory after the murder and sentenced to one year's imprisonment.
