TOOK PARIS GREEN

Aged Man of Lumberton Critical Condition.

Lumberton, N. C., April 15.—As a result of taking a quantity of paris-green about 6 o'clock this evening, H. McE. McMillan is critically ill. There seems to be no doubt of suicidal intent. He was removed to the hospital, where at 11 o'clock he was resting quietly, though the attending physician cannot yet say what the results will be.

Mr. McMillan is about 65 years old.

To Electrify Milwaukee Road.

Deer Lodge, Mont., Thursday, 15.—Work is to be commenced tomorrow on the important project of substituting electricity for steam as the motive power on the transcontinental lines of the Milwaukee Railroad. The line between Deer Lodge and Three Forks has been selected as the first unit for electrification. It is expected that the work will be completed in readiness for the running of electric trains between the two points by the end of this year. The plans call for the erection of five electric sub-stations to provide the extra power needed on the steep mountain grades.

Florida for Good Roads.

Gainesville, Fla., April 15.—Plans for a network of good roads covering every county of Florida are to be considered at the convention of the state good roads association which met here today for a two days' session. Another effort will be made at the next session of the legislature to secure the passage of a law providing for a state highway commission.

SONGS OF DIXIE IN CAPITAL

Southern Society Holds Banquet. Address by Daniels—Secretary of State Eulogized Wilson in Responding to Toast.

Washington, April 15.—Dixie's sons and daughters sang praises of her rapid commercial development and expanding influence in national affairs at the third annual banquet tonight of the Southern Society of Washington. Secretaries Bryan and Daniels put aside for the hour their responsibilities to attend, and other notable diners included Maurice Egan, Minister to Denmark, many of the southern congressional delegation, and southerners in Washington official life.

The scene was enlivened by the frequent singing of Dixie melodies. An old-time negro quartette led in song that found unanimous response. A North Carolinian, Secretary Daniels spoke for the womanhood of the south, referring to the changing scenes that have made woman figures in modern economic life.

Secretary Bryan, responding to the toast, "Grand Sons of the South" declared that when history was written President Wilson, the latest President the south had given the nation, would stand out as illustrative of a courage not surpassed by any warrior.

Governor Stuart, of Virginia, who was to have been one of the honor guests, was prevented from attending by the illness of a kinsman.

Dr. Clarence J. Owens, managing director of the Southern Commercial Congress, in his introduction of the toastmaster Claude N. Bennett, president of the society, spoke of the south's growing influence in National affairs. Senator Gore, of Oklahoma, told of the part that men and women of Dixie had taken in the up-building of the nation.

Others at the speakers' table included Rear Admiral Peary, Minister Chamorro, of Nicaragua, and Hilary Herbert, former secretary of the navy.

OSCAR STRAUS FAVORS REPEAL

Former Secretary of Commerce Before Committee.

Washington, April 15.—Oscar S. Straus, Secretary of Commerce and Labor, in the Roosevelt cabinet, advocated repealing the Panama tolls exemption today before the senate epauals committee. The committee then adjourned because there was no other witness to be heard.

Mr. Straus declared the exemption clause should be repealed regardless of the attitude of Great Britain and added that there should be no quibbling over the construction of a treaty on which the brightest members of the senate and house, and the most prominent international lawyers, are divided.

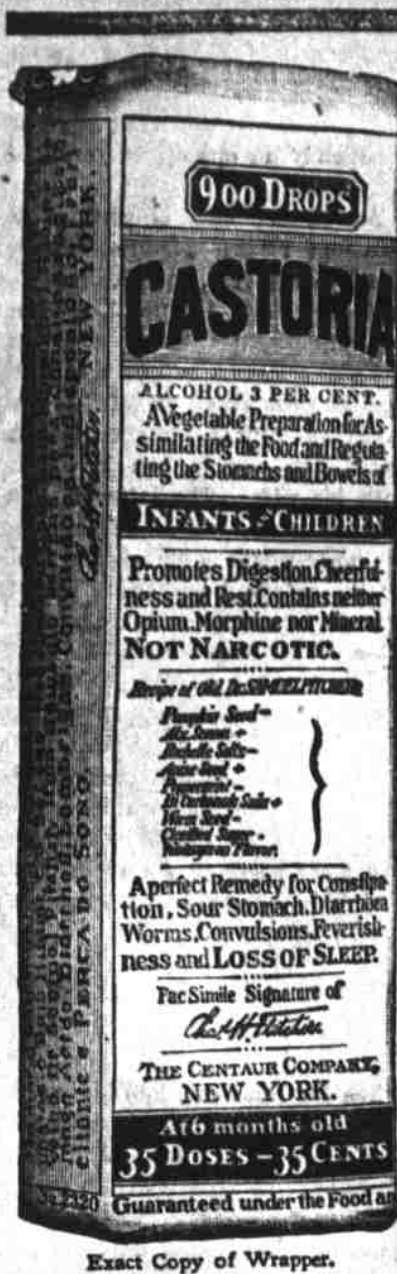

Mr. Straus declared former President Roosevelt believed the exemption of coastwise shipping did not violate the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, but thought the question should be submitted to arbitration.
