### WHITE WHALE DOES TANGO

**Rare Monster of Deep Frolics Near**  
Liner for Two Hours in Mid-Ocean.

New York.—A white whale, called a "beluga" among whalers, which means that it is rarer than the white elephant of Siam, was reported to have been sighted by the steamship Uranium, of the Uranium line.

The Uranium was bound for Halifax when the lookout sighted what he believed to be an upturned boat about 2 miles to starboard. The ship was slowed up and a lifeboat sent out. The white object suddenly came to life and a moment later began spouting. The white whale played and "tangoed" about the ship for nearly two hours. The Uranium had passed through a school of small whales a few hours before.

This is the first white whale reported by a vessel coming into this harbor in the past twenty-five years.

### AMBUSHED OFFICERS

Four Men Arrested for Shooting Charlotte Policeman.

Charlotte, N. C., July 19.—Four men, Jim Knotts, Jesse Helms, alias Jess Harlis, Will Stamey and Hiram Sykes, have been arrested here for assault from ambush and desperately wounding assistant chief of police Neill Elliott and patrol driver A. B. Moore.

Fearing the outbreak of mob spirit, over the shooting the sheriff carried the prisoners to Greensboro to be held for trial.

Stamey was paroled from the Federal penitentiary at Atlanta recently, and Knotts has served sentence on the county roads. According to the police, three of the men have confessed to doing the shooting early Saturday morning. The police, shot through the lungs are expected to recover.

### MAY SOLVE THE FALL OF MAN

New Tablet Hoped to Hold Key—Eve Not Named in First Part—Stone Is Broken.

Philadelphia.—The missing half of the clay tablets, the other half of which, as translated by Dr. Stephen Langdon of Jesus college, Oxford, told about the flood and the escape of Noah and how the fall of man ensued through his temptation by the river God Enki to eat of the tree of life, was found at the University of Pennsylvania museum. The university authorities made this announcement and said the tablet, which was discovered among the thousands of tablets in the Nippur collection, would be sent at once to Dr. Langdon for translation.

Nothing was said or intimated about Eve or any other woman in connection with the fall of man on the first fragment and Dr. Langdon expressed regret that the tablet was broken "in the most important place." Archaeologists at the university believe the newly found section will assist greatly in revealing the complete story of the creation, the flood and the fall of man.

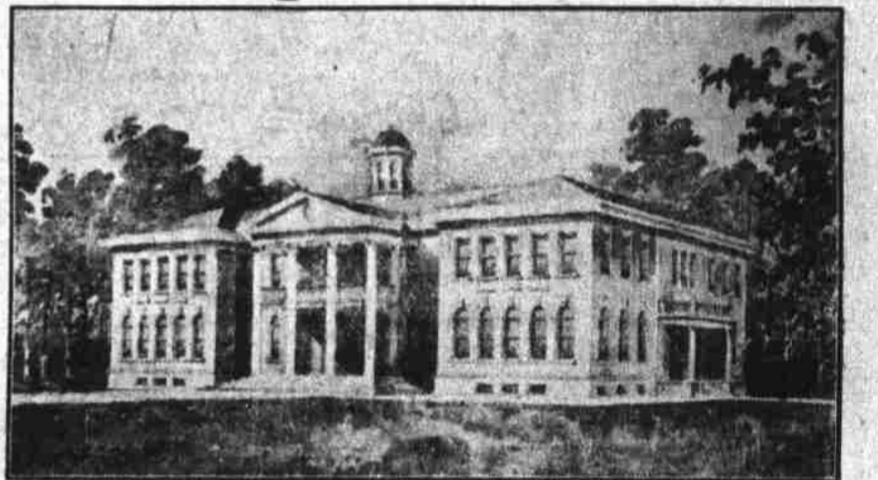
