MEETING OF ALDERMEN FOR MONTH OF AUGUST

The Board of City Aldermen met in regular monthly session on August 3, with Mayor Sutton and Alderman Webb, Beeton, Mewborn and Fort present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

B. F. Bursell made application to operate a pool room on South Queen street. Deferred until next meeting.

Because of bodily infirmity, David Davis was granted permission to peddle chickens and eggs without license.

Action on an application for license to operate a cafe on West North St. by Robert Walker was deferred until the next regular meeting. Similar disposition was made of the application of Isaac Milligan for license to run a cafe on West North street, Clara Miller to operate a cafe on East Beach street.

In the case of Sam Wooten, who desired the city to pay his wages since he was hurt by a mule in the employ of the sanitation department, the aldermen decided not to pay his wages for the time lost, but that the city should stand his physician's bill.

Alderman Webb was appointed a committee to examine road machinery now in use in Pitt county.

The mayor and city attorney were appointed a committee to investigate the legality of furnishing electric current to the town of Snow Hill, a proposition for which had been under discussion.

The board ordered a sewer extension on Atlantic avenue from Pollock street to David Dixon's residence.

The annual appropriation of \$150 for the volunteer firemen was made.
