The grand jury this morning in Superior Court returned a true bill against Annie McGee, a negro, indicted for the murder of a man of her race in an alley near North street several weeks ago. The woman's trial is set for the present term of the court.

SUSPECTED ROBBERS.

Alb Bartfield and James Davis, negroes, were arrested in Southeast Kinston Wednesday afternoon, on the suspicion that they were connected with the long string of robberies here recently. The men claimed that they had only that day come from Clark's, near New Bern, and had secured employment, and were to start to work today. They were released.

Three daughters and four sons survive, all of them residing at Moncure. Local business interests consider that there is little doubt that the Export Company will buy, however, as well as the Imperial and the smaller concerns which will do business here.

ARMY OFFICER OFF FOR THE PHILIPPINES

Lieut. D. S. Wilson of the Thirtieth United States Infantry, Mrs. Wilson and their little daughter have left after a visit with relatives in Greene and Pitt county, on a 14,000-mile journey to the Philippines. The Wilsons will sail from San Francisco on September 5. Lieutenant Wilson was until recently an officer of the Seventeenth Infantry, stationed at Fort McPherson, near Atlanta. The Thirtieth is at Fort McKinley, in the outskirts of Manila, one of the biggest posts under the flag, where several thousand infantry, cavalry and artillery is quartered. His tour of duty in the islands will probably extend through several years.

Judge Daniels Will Not Deal Severely With Them, But Wants Them to Move.

Four proprietresses of disorderly places now in jail as the result of Judge F. H. Daniels' determination to clean the segregated district of Kinston of its habitues. Louise Griggs was late Wednesday arrested at Granger, a station five miles from the city, while waiting for a train. The woman escaped from the city when she learned that she was to be arrested, and was driven in an automobile to Granger. An effort was made to arrest the man who drove her to the station, but he escaped through the woods. The officer was not positive as to his identity, but suspected him of being a married man who is alleged to have consorted with the woman.

Louise Griggs was interned with Hattie Johnson, Alma Hudson and Irene Barnes, jailed Monday and Tuesday. Judge Daniels, in Superior Court, stated that he would not be severe in dealing with the women, but his activity is regarded as sure to mean the elimination of the immoral element from South Kinston, is fornication and adultery.

SMALL BOY WITH LIKING FOR RAKE

The neighborhood at Gordon and Independent streets in this city claims to have produced the model small boy. The oddity's mother is genuinely alarmed.

He aroused suspicion by loitering about his parents' backyard late Wednesday with a rake. He showed evidence of being in the throes of a deep mental conflict for some time. The youngster, who is twelve or thirteen years old, finally made up his mind with a jerk, strode to the front yard and commenced clearing it of the grass which had grown there unhindered all through the summer. He kept his counsel, looked serious, and sweated until dark. It is asserted that he never did anything of the kind voluntarily before. He is an ordinary small boy, with a dislike of stiff collars, an expert at bending pins for fishing, and capable of accumulating as many marbles, jawsharps and other juvenile treasure as any lad.

This morning the new convert to the cause of civic beauty finished cleaning his own front yard, started on a neighbor's and enlisted the aid of a youngster who stopped to look and envy. The recruit declared he just doted on hoeing, and he was equipped for the task. The oddity told him, "I intend to see that all the front yards on this block look pretty." Where the inspiration came from is puzzling his relatives.

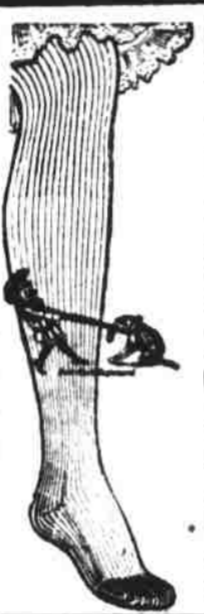
