JONES COUNTY FARMER DEAD.

Mr. Harvey Andrews, about forty years of age, and a well-known farmer of his section, died at his home in Jones county this morning at 3 o'clock. He leaves a wife and several children. Mrs. Andrews is a sister to Messrs. A. F. and I. T. Haskins of this city.

PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE EXPECTED TO REPORT.

The Chamber of Commerce's playground committee is expected to report at the next meeting of the directors, which will be held in the last part of this or early in next week. The committee was named to consider possible sites, make estimates of cost, etc., for a municipal-owned park for children's use.

FALSE ALARM.

Sleepers at the city hall were aroused at 4 a. m. today by a false fire alarm. A fire alarm wire broke, and in some manner a circuit was made by which the gong in the engine house was sounded. The indicator registered one, a number which has no meaning in the code, and the apparatus was not hooked up. The trouble was discovered later.

HELD FOR WIFE ABANDONMENT.

Magistrate Charles Bagby, at the courthouse Tuesday evening, held Jesse Mabe, a young man of East Kinston, for abandonment. Mabe's wife is an invalid, and had to be assisted into the court. The facts in the case, although sufficient to cause the magistrate to send the case up to a higher court, were not entirely inimical to the defendant.

SPRINTER ESCAPED POLICE OFFICERS.

Henry Isler, accused of an assault upon his brother, William Isler, in Sand Hill township, outran the sheriff, a policeman and a constable who went to arrest him, it was stated at the courthouse today. The officers approached to within twenty-five yards of Isler, who is a negro, before he caught sight of them. There was nothing about the man's crime to warrant the use of their revolvers, and the trio allowed Isler to escape after a hot chase rather than shoot at him.

Mr. Bernard P. Smith used a portion of the second chapter of Ephesians as the basis of his sermon at the Gordon Street Christian church evangelistic meetings Tuesday night. DELIVERING DIRECTORIES.

Agents of the Hill Directory Company of Richmond are today delivering copies of the Kinston 1914 directory to business men and other purchasers of the work. The new book is more complete than the last published, in 1912, and contains the names and addresses of people over sixteen years of age and workers under that age in the city and environments. The book indicates a considerable increase of population, but varying methods of securing the data in 1912 and 1914 make it impracticable to give a fair estimate of the increase, it is stated.

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

DR. PARROTT MAKES INTERESTING DISCOVERY

Dr. J. M. Parrott has discovered why an especially fine scuppernong grape-vine on his plantation in this county failed to produce for several seasons, but has now resumed. The cause is interesting. The vine was given the same careful attention as is everything else on the model Parrott farm, and the superintendent could ascribe no reason for the sudden cessation of fruiting several years ago. Dr. Parrott's interest was aroused. He learned that a small wild grape vine which grew in proximity to it had been removed.

Dr. Parrott's investigation resulted in the discovery that the scuppernong is a female only, and that the suddenly barren vine required pollinizing from the fecundating dust of the wild grape. A cutting of the outcast was planted within the scuppernong vine and the result was astonishing. Unlike the bi-sexed corn, the stalk of which is male to the ear, the hermaphrodite cotton and other plants, the scuppernong has but one sex and is incapable of producing without the aid of another grape.

TICK ERADICATION IS UNDERTAKING IN LENOIR

Dr. Foss of the bureau of animal husbandry of the national Department of Agriculture, here Monday evening in the interest of the local cattle tick eradication work, stated that 500 farms and other places in Lenoir county are now under quarantine. Thousands of animals have been dipped, and many more will be similarly treated in the coming three or four months. It is probable that a number of cattle will still be under quarantine during the early part of 1915.

The government agents in charge of the eradication work have, by prosecutions and other stringent methods of enforcing the quarantine, about eliminated the danger of infection of cattle in this county from animals allowed by their owners in the surrounding counties, which have no quarantine, to stray across the line.
