Savannah, Ga., Oct. 28.—"The gov-
ernment's investigations have led to
the definite conclusion that pellagra
comes from living on a one-sided diet,
and that it is in no way contagious
or infectious," said Dr. Joseph Gold-
berger, of the United States Public
Health Service, here today.
"Only those whose diet contains too
little of certain classes of proteid
foods, such as milk, lean meat or le-
gumes (beans and peas) develop the
disease," continued Dr. Goldberger.
