Section 1. That Kinston Manufac turing Co., its associates, mecessor and assigns hereinafter called grantees, be, and hereby are, given and granted full authority, right and francisce to locate, construct, main tain and operate tracks, switche turnouts and appurtenances and oth or appliances to operate a railroad by steam, or other motive nower, a common carrier of freight and no track to connect with other commo carriers of freight and passengers, o as a portion thereof, in, through, over across and upon those streets of the City of Kinston hereinafter specif cally mentioned, and no others, and in the manner for the term, or terms and upon the conditions hereinafte provided, and under the regulation fully and specifically set out in this

Sec. 2. The course of said railroad track or switch showing the portion of the streets to be used is as fol-

Beginning at a point in the Atlan-tic Coast Line Railroad on Bright street, between Queen and Heritage streets that will make a practical railroad curve across the corner lo known as the old electric light plant out on to Heritage street possibly and thence south on Heritage street eross Shine street as far as is nece sary to make connection with Kin on Manufacturing Company and Neuse river, so as to use not to ex-ceed 150 feet on Bright street, s running from the Atlantie Coas Line Railroad, and not to exceed 75 feet on Heritage street running across Shine street, in the manner above se
