The draping of Mexico City in flags and the observance of a holiday commemorating the inception of the Madero revolution will not be conducive to an early reconciliation of the Mexican factions. It will no doubt serve to fan the flames of rebellion and widen the breach.

The statement of Manager Taylor of the Kinston Cotton Mill in which he says that not only the premises of the people have been helped, but an improvement in their general services is noticeable, is significant of the fact that good seed, when properly sown, will produce good fruit.

Today in Philadelphia the society women are making "monkeys" of themselves with their annual dog show, in which the puffed little terriers are being exhibited, having

been groomed and perfumed for the occasion. If these women would take some of the "Colonel's" anti-race suicide advice and raise full-blooded American boys and girls instead of "blue-blooded" Airdale terriers, their "society" would be uplifting instead of disgusting.

Every year a lot of bicycle riders congregate at Madison Square Garden, New York, and have an endurance test for six days and nights. When these races were first put on the riders rode incessantly, and the reports told of the men being driven to their tasks like cattle after they had become so tired to have any reason, and for weeks after the races some of them were "slightly." The European war is the greatest blot upon civilization, and it should be the last war that the nations of this world permit to mar their establishments.
