POLLARD JURY COULD
NOT AGREE; DISCHARGED

 Greenville, N. C., Nov. 25.—The second trial of Pollard, the Farmville druggist, for the murder of Chief of Police Smith there early in the year, resulted in a mistrial late yesterday. Judge Peebles discharged the jury after it had been hung since Saturday afternoon. The jury stood 10 to 2 for acquittal. The judge had said that he believed the jury stubborn, and that he might hold them together until the end of the year. Counsel declared to His Honor that the men in the box should be given credit for having acted conscientiously, however, and Judge Peebles relented. S. M. Pollard is under a five-year sentence from the previous trial.

ELECT OFFICERS FOR
THE KENNEDY HOME

Rev. G. L. Merrill of Maysville, Superintendent of New Baptist Orphanage—Over Half a Hundred Children in Institution.

At a recent meeting of the executive committee of the Thomsville Orphanage at the Kennedy Memorial Home, the eastern branch of the orphanage near Falling Creek, the organization of the new institution was completed by the election of the following officers for the coming year: Superintendent, Rev. G. L. Merrill of Maysville; Superintendent of the Farm, Herman Sutton of Kinston; Teacher for the School, Mrs. Mary Cooke of Louisburg; Custodian of the Biggs Building, Mrs. Bettie Dunn of Scotland Neck. The Biggs and Lenoir county buildings are the dormitories at the home.

There are now 51 children in the Kennedy Home, and 413 at Thomsville, where the main institution of the kind owned by the North Carolina Baptists is located. This makes a total of 464 children being cared for by both the orphanage and the branch. Four children from Lenoir county are now at the orphanage, the latest addition to the little family being Miss Elizabeth Blackburn of Kinston. Another, a little boy, is to be admitted as soon as there is a vacancy.

There has recently been constructed a long distance telephone line to the home, and the rural free delivery route going out in that direction from the Kinston postoffice has been extended to serve the institution. These conveniences place the home in direct postal, telegraphic and telephonic communication with Kinston. Falling Creek remains the freight station.

The Baptist orphanages are now caring for more children and doing greater work than ever before, and the prospects for a useful future are splendid.
