LENOIR TWENTY-FIFTH OF THE COTTON COUNTIES

In the preliminary report of cotton ginned by counties in North Car-line for the crops of 1914 and 1913 by William J. Harris, director of the census, it is shown that in 1914, so far Lenoir county has ginned 9,060 bales this year, and 8,985 in 1913. The county ranks twenty-fifth among the sixty big cotton-producing counties. Pitt county this year has gin-ned 12,971 bales, Onslow 3,863, Duplin 8,564, Wayne 26,264, Jones 4,872, Craven 4,305 and Greene 6,701.

PENSION WARRANTS FOR

LENOIR VETERANS HERE. Clerk of Superior Court J. T. Heath has received the State pension warrants for Confederate veteran and widows of veterans in this county who are pensioners. The total allowed in the county is \$4,100. There is one veteran of the first class, drawing \$120 per annum, the pensioner being blind and totally incapacitated. Various degrees of injury sustained in the war and other things determine the classification of the pension ers. There are in the second class three, drawing \$60 each; in the third class six, drawing \$48 each, and in the fourth 85 veterans and 56 widows. each receiving \$32. Among the warrants is one for D. L. Stone of Kinston, "dead." Stone, however, isn't dead, as the pension bureau has learned since he was reported to have answered the final tattoo, and there is \$48 awaiting him in the clerk's office. Veteran Stone's whereabouts are unknown to the clerk.
