**CONVICTS HAVE HOPE
IN A "SANTA" BLEASE**

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 18.—With
Christmas only a week off, the con-
victs in the state penitentiary today
were looking forward to the usual
batch of holiday pardons from Gov.
Cole Blease. He nearly emptied the
"pen" with his pardons Thanksgiving,
when he freed all varieties of criminals
from "lifers" to "drunks." If the
governor follows his usual custom this
Yuletide, he will make the condition
that the prisoners going out into the
world abstain from the use of liquor.
His record to date stands at close
to 1,500 pardons.

**WINTER WHEAT CROP
WILL BE FAR SHORT**

Washington, Dec. 17.—Dry weather
and Hessian fly have so seriously af-
fected the winter wheat crop that the
1915 yield probably will not be more
than 580,000,000 bushels, according
to an estimate today by the depart-
ment of agriculture. This is nearly
100,000,000 bushels under last year's
total production. This year's acre-
age, 41,263,000 acres, is the great-
est ever sown.

**BIG SHIPMENTS OF
COTTON TO EUROPE**

New Orleans, La., Feb. 17.—The ex-
port movement of cotton today was
the largest of any day since the first
of the season and the beginning of the
European war. Total clearances from
all United States ports for foreign
ports amounted to 107,331 bales.

**RIVER AND HARBOR BILL
COMPLETED IN COMMITTEE**

Washington, Dec. 17.—The annual
river and harbor appropriation bill,
carrying \$34,138,580 for waterway im-
provements throughout the country,
was completed tonight by the house
rivers and harbors committee. Army
engineers estimates were reduced by
nearly \$20,000,000 and the bill ap-
propriated only for work on projects
which already have been begun, mak-
ing no provision for new undertak-
ings.

Cincinnati, O., Dec. 17.—Frank G.
Hohl, a notorious automobile bandit,
was shot to death by policemen here
today after a sensational three hours'
of crime, which included daylight rob-
beries of two Cincinnati banks, theft
of an automobile and a pistol duel
with the police, resulting in wounds
to one officer expected to prove fatal.
Thirteen thousand and one hundred
dollars are missing as the result of
the bank robberies. The police believe
that Hohl, in his wild automobile
drives, managed to pass the money
along to confederates.

AERO RACE IS OFF**

San Francisco, Dec. 18.—Arnold
Kruckman has returned to San Fran-
cisco, after having completed a tour
of the world. He was engaged by the
Panama-Pacific International Ex-
position to arrange for an aerial race
around the world in 1915, as one of
the big features of the exposition.
Owing to the existing conditions
in Europe and parts of the Orient, as
a result of the world-wide war, the
exposition management was forced to
abandon the race, as the greater part
of the course was necessarily through
the countries engaged in war.
