**LIZZIE'S TROUSSEAU WASN'T READY**

Lissie Lawson, who was last week married to the Rev. Charles Borum, a former Virginian, in a Boston suburb, has been discovered to be the daughter of Isaac Lawson, a negro who left Craven county in 1883, and settled in Massachusetts. The wedding of the white clergyman to the negro caused a considerable upstir in New England as well as in this section. As stated in The Free Press before, Rev. George B. Hanrahan, pastor of the Atkinson Memorial Presbyterian church here, probably "enjoyed" a passing acquaintance with the "Rev." Borum at Newport News, Va., upon one occasion. A funny incident in connection with the union of the white man and black woman was that the bride insisted that unless she could walk up to the altar in an entire new trousseau she would not wed. The appointed hour arrived and Lissie Lawson was like Happy Hoolligan, absent from the church, which was a colored church. Suddenly the doors were thrown open and the intended bridegroom rushed in to inform the waiting guests that the ceremony would have to be postponed because she hadn't completed her "trouser." It was several hours afterwards when the wedding was consummated.

**LIEN BOND BUSINESS SHOWS STEADY INCREASE**

As an indication that business is "opening up," Clerk of the Court Jesse Heath called attention this morning to the large number of lien bonds and other papers being entered at his office now. No less than eighteen papers were filed Tuesday by one concern. The probating season is a little late, as is evidenced by the fact that in January of last year more than \$500 in fees was taken in at the clerk's office, according to report, while in the month just ended the fees totalled only about \$145.

**LIEUT. DARDEN'S PICTURE IN "IMMORTAL 600"**

A new edition of "The Immortal Six Hundred," just from the press, contains a half-tone likeness of Lieut. J. H. Darden, C. S. A. The immortal six hundred were that number of Confederate officers imprisoned on Morris Island, South Carolina, the fort on which was at the time under the fire of their own guns. Lieutenant Joseph Darden of Falling Creek is too well known in Kinston to need any description. Suffice it to say, he was one of the most gallant of the 600. The photograph, one of many in the second edition of Major J. Ogden Murray's book, takes first place next to the frontispiece, which is the author's likeness. In the picture Lieutenant Darden is attired in Confederate gray, his cap set at a jaunty angle, and looking very much like a good officer, which he was, according to all the reports that have been had since the war.

"The Immortal Six Hundred" was written in refutation of Northern

claims that their officers and men were badly treated in Southern prisons. Major Murray gives the commandant and garrison on Morris Island credit for having been a gallant and humane lot of men, but the general commanding and some others higher up do not share in the estimate. The roster of the 600 is carried in the book, a handsome volume, well illustrated.

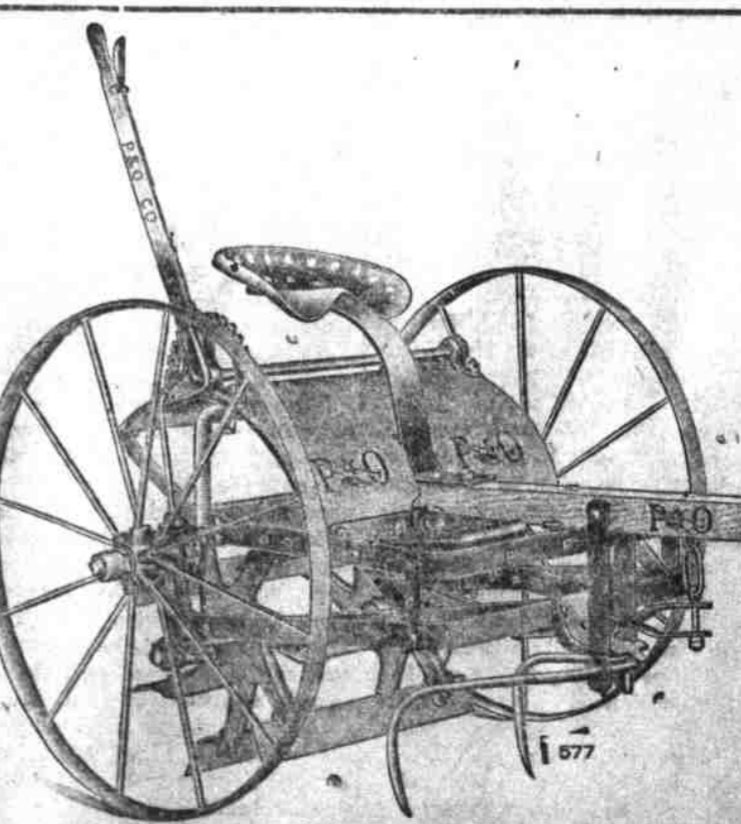
