MATERIAL TO COMPLETE PEYTON AVE. PAYING.

The city authorities have ordered nough Lillington cement-clay-gravel material to complete the improvement of a block on Peyton avenue between Queen and Heritage streets. A carload of the material presented by the manufacturers to the city paved about a third of the block, and it was decided to order about twice as much The demonstration proved everything the makers claimed for the composition, it is said. Bryant Taylor, the county roads superintendent, declares it is the best material for roadways he has yet seen. Its cost is about 40 cents a square yard. or less than one-sixth the cost of brick. The pavement somewhat resembles asphalt, is smooth and easily placed, and if oiled frequently enough can be easily rendered waterproof. The mixture is made at Lillington, N. C.
