YANKEES ARE GREAT OLD BLUFFERS, SAYS DIE POST



"When something does not suit the Yankees," says Die Post, "they are accustomed to adopt as threatening and as frightful a sabre-rattling tone as possible. If this does not come to pass, however, if the person thus threatened replies with the strongest expressions and shows that he is not scared and will not let himself be driven into a state of funk, the swaggering Yankees calm themselves and quiet down."
