**YOUNG GATTIS BOY WAS RETURNED TO SCHOOL.**

Durham Youth Who Escaped From School for Feeble-Minded Was Brought Back By His Mother Thursday Night.

The mother of Herbert Gattis, of Durham, who escaped some days ago from the North Carolina School for the Feeble-Minded, brought that young man back to the institution, near here, Thursday night. With the return of Gattis there is now but one of the five lads who have at recent times escaped from the school, at large.

L. Perry of Goldsboro and James Mason of Wilmington, who accompanied the former to his home, were turned over by Perry's relatives to the Goldsboro police and brought back. Hubert Brown, "a terror," whose home is in Rocky Mount, was captured by the police in Durham.

Harrison Thompson, enjoying his second period of freedom since his incarceration, cannot be located.

According to Superintendent C. B. McNairy all of the boys of the "Lorion" class, the highest grade of the feeble-minded. All are of criminal tendencies save Gattis, who is of excellent disposition. He is, Dr. McNairy states, a "splendid boy." The officials of the school believe the other conspirators, for a conspiracy there seems to have been, persuaded Gattis to leave with them.
