RESOLUTIONS ON DEATH OF EMMETT WOOTEN

Chamber of Commerce Attests to His Usefulness as Public Official and Citizen and Extends Sympathy to Members of Family

Below are printed the resolutions drawn up by a committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to give public testimonial to that body's regret at the untimely death of Emmett R. Wooten, Lenoir county's representative in the General Assembly and Speaker of the House, and extend its sympathy to the relatives of the late prominent Kinstonian:

"Be it Resolved, by the Directors of the Chamber of Commerce, at a special meeting, held on February 27th, 1915:

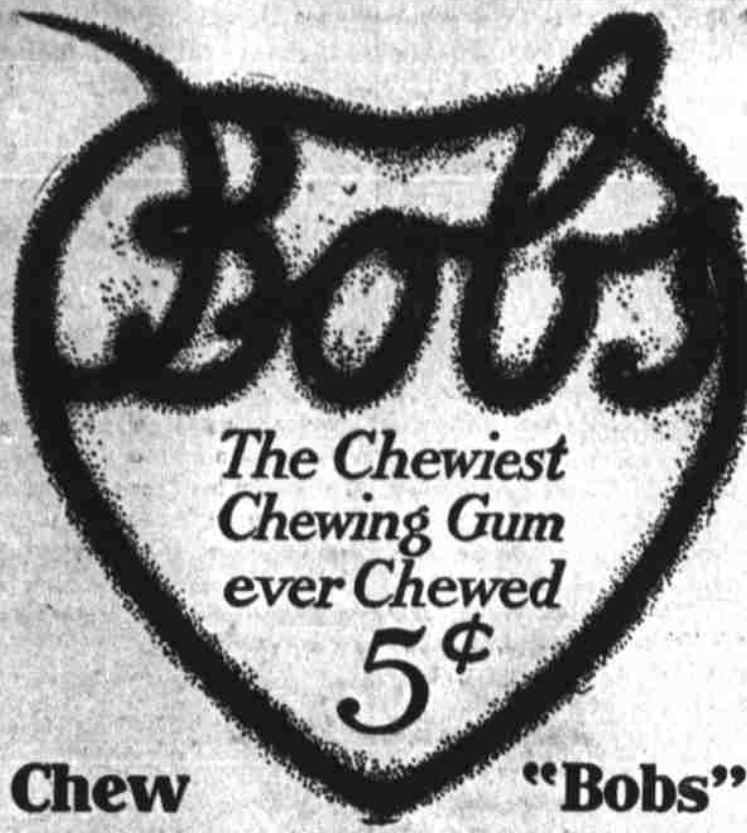
