### CONWAY 'OPEN SEWER' CASE IS COMPROMISED

East Kinston Boy Who Fell Into Hot Water In Ditch Gets \$2,000 and Father, for Mental Anguish, \$500. City Pays Two-Fifths and Company Responsible for Hot Water, Three-Fifths

(Daily Free Press, February 28)

Conway vs. City of Kinston and Lenoir Oil & Ice Co., a cause for \$10,000 in which an East Kinston man was suing because of alleged mental anguish and his small son for actual injury from falling into a ditch containing scalding water in Southeast Kinston, was settled out of court, but submitted to a jury in Superior Court today, the plaintiffs getting \$2,500 between them.

The division was \$1,550 by the company and \$950 by the city, \$2,000 going to the boy and \$500 to the parent. The city pays \$800 and the company \$1,200 to the boy and the city \$150 and the company \$350 to the parent. Another case for which the boy noted "open sewer" was responsible was the Stroud case, settled today in the same way. Settlement was on the same basis, the company giving the plaintiff three-fifths and the city two-fifths of \$275.

### CARTER LEAVING ALL UP TO HIS FRIENDS

Asheville, Feb. 27. ### LIFESAVERS TAKE OFF CREW UNLUCKY SHIP

Wilmington, Feb. 25.—The fishing schooner Thomas F. Austin of Philadelphia, which has been operating off the North Carolina coast, went ashore on the Cape Fear river bar at 11 o'clock last night and was dashed to pieces by the high seas. Captain C. Lee Reed and his crew of twelve men were rescued by life-savers from the coast guard station.

### GIRL WIFE DOESN'T HAVE TO LIVE WITH HUSBAND'S FAMILY

Judge Bond Dismisses Habeas Corpus Writ Today. Stroud vs. City and Oil & Ice Co. Compromised

Judge Bond this morning dismissed a writ of habeas corpus served on J. J. Davis of the Pink Hill section on Saturday at the instance of Daniel Mercer, who charged that Davis was keeping his wife, nee Miss Estelle Davis, from him. Judge Bond placed the costs on the petitioner. Mrs. Mercer, a young girl, declared that she would not live with Mercer's people, and had returned to her own family because she could not agree with the latter. Mrs. Mercer is said to have professed willingness to live with her husband at some place than his relatives' home.

This morning Stroud vs. City of Kinston and Lenoir Oil & Ice Co. was compromised in Superior Court after the case had been commenced. The plaintiff was suing for damages alleged to have been sustained when he fell into the noted "open sewer" in East Kinston near the Oil & Ice Co.'s plant into which hot water was allowed to escape. It was said at the Courthouse that about \$275 was the sum agreed upon in the compromise.

Late Saturday Newborn vs. Railroad was decided by a jury in favor of the defendant. The plaintiff asked \$440 for alleged carelessness in handling of livestock between a Kentucky point and Kinston. Two animals had died en route, and one was damaged, it was alleged.


