It has been known that Admiral Von Tirpitz' policy was not liked by the German Emperor, and some of the high government officials, and that only by the most insistent fighting for his ideas has he been able to put into effect and maintain the submarine warfare which has brought the governments of Germany and the United States so near the brink of war several times. Berlin interprets his withdrawal from the head of the admiralty as a peace omen. The German press is taking a more optimistic view of the outlook for satisfactory adjustment of the international controversy, and all the signs point to a modification of the war against non-combat-

The resignation of Admiral Von Tirpitz, coming so soon after the epochal fight between President Wilson and some would-be revolting congressmen for the preservation of the prestige and dignity of this nation, in which fight the policy of the President was overwhelmingly sustained, can very readily be accounted for as an evidence of the desire of the German people to maintain peaceful relations with this country. It is entirely safe to assume that the vote of the two branches of Congress in the "warning resolution" fight has had a splendid effect in Berlin. As was predicted, it has given the foreign powers to understand that the real sentiment of this country is upholding Woodrow Wilson, and that, notwithstanding the efforts of Mr. Bryan and others, who are patterning after him, to discredit the administration, the American people will decline to surrender their rights.

The German authorities have been impressed, no doubt, with the earnest determination of Mr. Wilson to preserve peace, and to do so on the high plane of maintained honor in every sense of the word. The Von Tirpitz removal should mean the early adjustment of the differences which have promised forebodingly since the Lusitania was sunk off the Irish coast last spring.
