nevertheless, becomes a material factor in the race. Mr. Kitchin so recognizes it.

Mr. Mitchell is a prosperous farmer, merchant and man of affairs. He is a prominent churchman, has represented his county in both branches of State Legislature and is generally recognized as one of the State's best men. He is a strong and able leader.

Mr. Mitchell bases his campaign on his sympathy with the policies of the Wilson administration with which he claims to be in entire accord. He believes that the Second District should be represented by a man who is in accord with the Administration, and his campaign, based upon that issue, will have instant attention and support, not only by the people of the Second District, but throughout the State and Nation.

When Mr. Kitchin first announced his opposition to the Administration's preparedness policy, The Free Press, though regretting his inability to line up with Mr. Wilson, felt that Mr. Kitchin's constituents should not criticize him too harshly because he could not support Mr. Wilson in one particular instance.

The Free Press believes that the large majority of the people of the Second District—as it believes is the case with reference to the people of the entire country—are supporting President Wilson and have been out of sympathy with the anti-administration stand of the representative from this District.
