#### NO BREAK AT PRESENT, AT LEAST.

As has been predicted in unofficial circles in Washington since the receipt of the latest German note, President Wilson has accepted the assurances contained thereconduct of the submarine warfare by which such warfare will be conducted with respect to the rights and privileges of neutrals and non-combatants using the high neas, an set forth in the international laws.

President Wilson's reply is short and to the point. He makes it very clear that the United States Government accepts the unconditional assurances of the German Government that the rights of Americans shall be respected, and that if such assurances were given by the German Government, conditioned on the result of diplomatic negotiations now pending with Great Britain, that the reply was unsatisfactory. The President declines, as h has heretofore done, to treat with Germany or to discuss in any way whatsoever, the relations of this Government with the British Government. That, of course, was to be expected. Violation of international law by one belligerent is no reason for another to do likewise. Two wrongs never made a right.

The President's note is plain and leaves no reason for any further discussion of the points at issue. The Free Press believes that when President Wilson is assured that such orders have been issued and are being executed by the German naval authorities as to guarantee the proper safeguarding of American life, that he will insist ipon a satisfactory reply from Great Britain and there s good reason to believe that the popular feeling of America will be just as cordial in support of such insistence as will insure proper respect for American rights by Great Britain as there has been in the German contro-
