MR. MITCHELL'S VISIT.

The voters of Kinston had an opportunity for the first time, many of them, at least, to see and size up Hon. Clingman W. Mitchell of Aulander, candidate for Democratic nomination for Congress from the Second District, Monday night when Mr. Mitchell addressed a representative audience at the Courthouse.

That there is a great deal of interest in the contest in the Second District was manifest by the close attention given Mr. Mitchell. He is not a bombastic political harranguer, but a man of parts which cannot but impress favorably those who meet and know him.

that he did not believe the attitude of Mr. Kitchin had truly reflected this sentiment. Mr. Mitchell's address on Monday night was free from any semblance of harsh or bitter criticism of his opponent and he announced that it was his intention to conduct a campaign entirely free from bitterness.

NO BREAK AT PRESENT, AT LEAST.

As has been predicted in unofficial circles in Washington since the receipt of the latest German note, President Wilson has accepted the assurances contained therein of the German Government of a modification of the conduct of the submarine warfare by which such warfare will be conducted with respect to the rights and privileges of neutrals and non-combatants using the high seas, as set forth in the international laws.

President Wilson's reply is short and to the point. He makes it very clear that the United States Government accepts the unconditional assurances of the German Government that the rights of Americans shall be respected, and that if such assurances were given by the German Government, conditioned on the result of diplomatic negotiations now pending with Great Britain, that the reply was unsatisfactory.

The President's note is plain and leaves no reason for any further discussion of the points at issue. The Free Press believes that when President Wilson is assured that such orders have been issued and are being executed by the German naval authorities as to guarantee the proper safeguarding of American life, that he will insist upon a satisfactory reply from Great Britain and there is good reason to believe that the popular feeling of America will be just as cordial in support of such insistence as will insure proper respect for American rights by Great Britain as there has been in the German controversy.

WHAT OTHERS SAY

IF BRITONS WERE PRUSSIANS.

Columbia State: "Passionate denunciation of the execution of eight leaders of the Dublin insurrectionists is heard—coming from men who feel and who can't think. Were Great Britain German, how many leaders of the Dublin insurgents would have been executed?"

Would Germany have been satisfied with executing the leaders? What would be the chances of unsuccessful insurgents in Dresden? What would be the mercy of Prussians to rebellious Hanoverians in the midst of this war?

One answer to the question is that in Hanover there are no rebels. Prussia, at least, is 'efficient.'

AGREEMENT WITH MEXICO.

Norfolk Ledger Dispatch: "Former critics of President Wilson's policy toward the Mexican government must agree that the recent understanding goes a long way toward establishing a friendly basis of co-operation for the future. Of the present situation the Washington Star says:

"President Wilson's approval of the tentative agreement reached between Gen. Scott and Gen. Obregon as to the conduct of the military situation in Mexico insures, so far as this country is concerned, a pacific relationship with the de facto government of Mexico. The agreement is subject to ratification by Carranza, but there is no reason to doubt that that will be forthcoming. It is most gratifying to find the two governments in accord for a complete and cordial co-operation between the military forces of both Mexico and the United States for the capture of Villa and the elimination of bandits in northern Mexico. It is of no consequence to the United States whether these objects are effected by

American troops or Mexican troops. The object of the American expedition into Mexico was to stop the raids upon American border cities and towns, and in order to accomplish this the expedition has been pressed far south in conditions that have made for serious difficulties and some danger of a rupture of relations between the United States and Mexico. The conference at El Paso was happily conceived to effect an adjustment to prevent such a break and to insure a successful clearance of the Mexican border territory of the bandits menacing the peace of both countries."
