DON'T block the fire escapes; you may need them yourself tonight. DON'T leave everything to the landlord; inspect your own house from cellar to garret and locate all exits. DON'T throw away lighted matches, cigars, or cigarettes. DON'T go into dark closets, bed rooms, or cellars, using matches or candles to light your way. DON'T use insecticides in the vicinity of open flame lights. Many such compounds contain volatile inflammable oils. DON'T use kerosene, benzine, or naphtha in lighting fires, or to quicken a slow fire—it may result in death. DON'T use gasoline or benzine to clean clothing near an open flame, light or fire. DON'T use alcohol lamps, especially if made of glass; they often break and the fluid is ignited at once. DON'T fill any lamp with gasoline, kerosene or other oils while the lamp is lighted. Keep the burners of all oil lamps thoroughly clean. DON'T fill kerosene lamps after dark or within 15 feet of the lights or fire. DON'T put ashes in wooden boxes or barrels. Keep ashes away from boards. Don't place them on dumb waiters or in closets. Hot ashes will take fire to themselves as they frequently have small bits of coal mixed in with them. DON'T use oils with a low flash point. DON'T accumulate rubbish in premises, cellars or workshops, and don't deposit such material on dumb waiters unless it is to be removed at once; while awaiting removal, keep such material in covered metal-lined receptacles. TEN MILLIONS DAMAGE AND 5 KNOWN DEAD W. CAROLINA

Captain J. C. Lipe and his two daughters, Miss Nellie Lipe and Mrs. Leo Muiholland, as they tried to escape. Lonnie Tressler, master mechanic for the Mt. Mitchell railroad and an unknown negro, were drowned while trying to supply persons marooned in the second story of the Gladstone Hotel, in the depot section with provisions. Miss Mabel Foster and of people saw it go. The Seaboard Air Line bridge at Mt. Holly, which was swept away about 2 o'clock, was two spans and of steel. The river at Mt. Holly is about 50 feet high. The lower floors of the mills are flooded. O. E. Hutchison, owner of the mills, lost 150 bales of cotton. Cotton and live stock were carried down the river from Mt. Holly.

Statesville, July 16.—A report late tonight states that the Southern Power Company's dam at Lookout, is safe and the river is falling. derbit, were swept away and drowned, according to reports, although this statement has not been verified, and the two together with Miss Marnie Walker, who was visiting her sister, are placed among the missing.

The Southern Railway bridge is washed away and train service from all points is suspended indefinitely. Flood damage along the Catawba river in Iredell and adjoining counties will run into the millions of dollars.

At nightfall the river was running 40 feet above normal, nearly 20 feet above all previous high water marks, and was still rising. The Alpspugh and Lilledoun cotton mills, in Alexander county, are reported to have been washed away about noon. Situation Bad Around Twin-City. Winston-Salem, July 16.—The flood of Friday night and Saturday played several particular kinds of havoc in this section of the State. The railroad schedules of the Southern are all shot to pieces between North Wilkesboro and this city, while there are no telegraphic connections with points beyond Doonaha, a few miles from this city.
