AMATEUR BALL PLAYERS TO GET AID FROM BIG LEAGUERS AT CLEVELAND

Cleveland, July 22.—Amateur ball players will get their chance in Cleveland this season. A newspaper has promoted a scheme whereby four baseball experts, two of them ex-leaguers, will report weekly on the best player seen in action during the seven days. Scores of amateur teams here fighting out the city championships.

In September the best players selected will be divided into two or four teams, as available material warrants, and a series of games played at league park. Manager Lee Fohl of the Indians will select what he believes to be the two most likely looking amateurs and give them a six-weeks' tryout next spring with his team.

Managers of bush leaguers also will be here and sign up any of the amateurs which look good to them. Some amateur games here draw 50,000 to 100,000 fans.
