Death of A. M. Haskitt.

Aaron Merrill Haskitt died recently at Port Norfolk, Va., in his 79th year. He was a brother of Mr. John P. Haskitt of Kinston. Mr. Haskitt had been in failing health for some time. He was a native of Carteret County, N C. He served in the Tenth North Carolina Regiment during the War Between the States. He is survived by his wife, a son residing at Philade phia, and a daughter at Port Norfolk, together with two brothers, residing at Kinston and Greenville, N. C. The funeral was held at Port Norfolk and the burial at Oak City, N. C.

League Will Be Big Affair.

Rev. James E. Holder, the colored minister and physician of this cits delegated by the State Board of Health to organize the North Caralina Negro Health and Civic League in the State, expects the organization ultimately to have a membership "in the tens of thousands." The first branch will be organized here Tuesday night. After organizing in Lenoir County Dr. Holder will rest for two or three months to see how the thing works. At the organization meeting at St. Augustus' A. M. E. Zion Church, 312 North Street he will give an illustrated lecture on the hookworm, presenting Hardy, whom nobody knows, in parrative and picture.

Abe Willis Was Unusual Colored Man.

The burial of Abe Willis took place Thursday morning at 11 o'clock. It had been set for Wednesday afternoon, when white friends of the old colored barber went to see him buried but learned at the cemetery of the postponement. The funeral ser vice, in accordance with a custom among the colored people, will be held later. Abe Willis, who was 70 years of age, was born at aristocratic old Edenton, and as a slave was the property of Prof. DeBerniere Hooper, who taught Greek and French at the University of North Carolina when it was reomenedhaving been closed during the War Between the States-in 1877. Willis came here soon after the war. He brought with him a certain amount of "culture" for which his former master was largely responsible. Of the highest type of his race, Abe Willis sat in the jury box here in 1883 and condemned to death a member of his race charged with the nameless crime. The defendant, Guilford Soon, was convicted and publicly executed. In the same case Hon. N. J. Rouse made his first appearance as a member of the bar.
