Net Out at New Bern.
New Bern, like Kinston, is gathering in its vargrants. Caught in the net there is "Chinaman," a local colored person.

Community Meeting March 3.
The March community meeting will be held Sunday, the 3rd, it was announced Thursday. Judge John A. Oates of Fayetteville will be the speaker.

Qualifies as Executor.
T. W. Mewborn has qualified as executor of the estate of the late Mrs. Sarah L. Askew. The estate's value is estimated at \$20,000. Beneficiaries are brothers and sisters, nephews and nieces of Mrs. Askew.

Death of A. M. Haskitt.
Aaron Merrill Haskitt died recently at Port Norfolk, Va., in his 79th year. He was a brother of Mr. John P. Haskitt of Kinston. Mr. Haskitt had been in failing health for some time. He was a native of Carteret County, N. C. He served in the Tenth North Carolina Regiment during the War Between the States. He is survived by his wife, a son residing at Philadelphia, and a daughter at Port Norfolk, together with two brothers, residing at Kinston and Greenville, N. C. The funeral was held at Port Norfolk and the burial at Oak City, N. C.

League Will Be Big Affair.
Rev. James E. Holder, the colored minister and physician of this city delegated by the State Board of Health to organize the North Carolina Negro Health and Civic League in the State, expects the organization ultimately to have a membership "in the tens of thousands." The first branch will be organized here Tuesday night. After organizing in Lenoir County Dr. Holder will rest for two or three months to see how the thing works. At the organization meeting at St. Augustus' A. M. E. Zion Church, 312 North Street, he will give an illustrated lecture on the hookworm, presenting Tom Hardy, whom nobody knows, in narrative and picture.

Abe Willis Was Unusual Colored Man.
The burial of Abe Willis took place Thursday morning at 11 o'clock. It had been set for Wednesday afternoon, when white friends of the old colored barber went to see him buried but learned at the cemetery of the postponement. The funeral service, in accordance with a custom among the colored people, will be held later. Abe Willis, who was 70 years of age, was born at aristocratic old Edenton, and as a slave was the property of Prof. DeBerniere Hooper, who taught Greek and French at the University of North Carolina when it was reopened—having been closed during the War Between the States—in 1877. Willis came here soon after the war. He brought with him a certain amount of "culture" for which his former master was largely responsible. Of the highest type of his race, Abe Willis sat in the jury box here in 1883 and condemned to death a member of his race charged with the nameless crime. The defendant, Guilford Soon, was convicted and publicly executed. In the same case Hon. N. J. Rouse made his first appearance as a member of the bar.

Mrs. Parrott's Will.
Following the funeral of Mrs. Jacob F. Parrott at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday the will of Mrs. Parrott was read to the assembled relatives and friends of the decedent at the residence, North and McLewain streets. This action was in keeping with an old custom. The will was read by its custodian, Cashier L. J. Mewborne of the Farmers & Merchants Bank. The home, with its furnishings, becomes the property of Mrs. Parrott's husband. At his death, under the terms of the will, sale will be made of this property and the proceeds used to set up an infirmary at the Kennedy Memorial Home, the Baptist orphanage a few miles from here. To Miss Eliza Jackson, a niece, was willed a dwelling and lot located at 302 North McLewain Street. To Rudolph Croon was willed a dwelling and lot at Winterville. Bequests of \$200 to Mrs. J. H. Scott and \$50 to Mrs. Parrott's cook were included in the instrument. The remainder of the estate, both personal and real estate, will be divided between the heirs of the late W. E. Sutton and the late Jesse Jackson, half to the Sutton and half to the Jackson heirs. The estate is estimated to be worth \$80,000.

Meeting of Children of Confederacy.
The Winnie Davis Chapter, Children of the Confederacy, will meet at the residence of Mrs. Herman H. Grainger, Queen Street and Peyton Avenue, Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock. All members are requested to be present, as there is some important business to be transacted.

Chivalry in Officialdom.
Manpower moves mountains. It moved the county's automobile used by Miss Mary G. Shotwell, assistant superintendent of schools, Thursday morning. The car balked back of the Courthouse. So officials gathered about it, Miss Shotwell took the wheel, and the Ford was given a running start of 75 or 100 feet, whereupon off it went pretty as one could wish. Those assisting were Judge H. C. V. Peebles, Supt. of Schools Jos. Kinsey, Janitor Oscar White, Dr. J. S. Mitchener, health officer, and W. T. Kyzer, farm demonstration agent. The nine arms of these five dignitaries were a mighty force in unity.
