### Enlarging Warehouse.

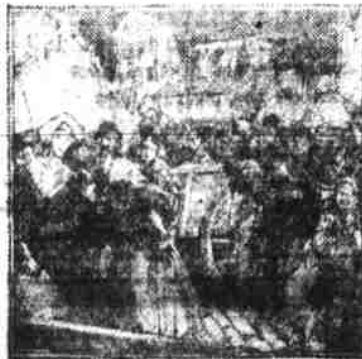

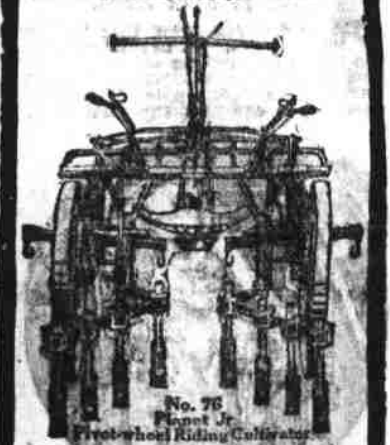
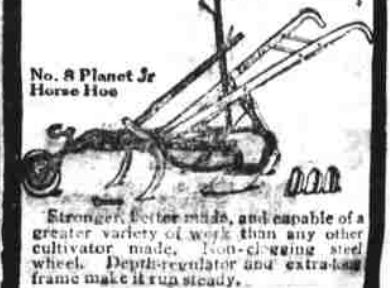
